



The Government has launched what is claimed to be the largest ever public information campaign, aimed at preparing Britain for leaving the EU, urging businesses to check what they need to do to prepare for a no-deal exit.

UKWA has prepared a series of fact sheets for the logistics sector on key issues surrounding a no-deal Brexit, but for more detail, you should visit: www.gov.uk/get-ready-brexit-check.

Although a Brexit deal has been agreed, it needs to be ratified. The UK could still leave with no deal on 31 October 2019 if the UK and EU do not approve and sign the withdrawal agreement.

Customs, Tariffs & Procedures



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By now importers and exporters should have reviewed contracts with suppliers and customers to determine who is the importer and who is the exporter, agreed changes to terms of delivery where possible and fully understood their transport and customs requirements.

Importing from the EU after 31st October

What you need to do now to make sure you're able to receive goods from the EU, if the UK leaves the EU without a deal.

- Make sure your business has an EORI number that starts with GB
- Decide who will make the import declarations
- Check temporary tariff rates in the Tariff Reference Document issued on 8th October 2019
- Check changes on the ways you can pay import VAT
- If you want to use Transitional Simplified Procedures (TSP) for importing from the EU through Ro/Ro ports, check whether goods are on the 'controlled' list
- If you plan to use TSP for importing from the EU through Ro/Ro ports, develop an internal procedure for capturing the data that needs to be entered in your records
- If you plan to use TSP for goods subject to duty, apply for a Deferment Account
- Set up a Duty Deferment Account if you import regularly goods that are subject to duty
- Check whether there is anything else you need to do for the type of goods you import
- Apply for Inward Processing if importing goods for repair and re-export



Customs, Tariffs & Procedures, continued

Non-preferential tariff rates and quotas on imports if the UK leaves the EU with no deal

A new temporary tariff will apply not only to EU imports but for imports from all countries, unless the UK has agreed Continuity Agreements with countries that currently have a free trade agreement with the EU.

Tariff-rate quotas (TRQ)

If you are importing certain agricultural products you should check how temporary tariff quotas may affect you.

Exporting from the UK to the EU after 31st October

What you need to do now to make sure you're able to send goods from the UK to the EU after Brexit.

- Check your importer has an EU EORI number
- Decide who will transport your goods outside the UK
- Decide who will make the export declarations and if you want to export your goods using transit
- Check the tariff code for your goods – and whether there is anything else you need to do for the type of goods you export
- Apply for Outward Processing if exporting goods for process and re-import
